Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The world I see through the window of my study is white. The road is snow covered and icy. No grass is visible on our front lawn. JCPS cancelled classes yesterday and delayed them for two hours this morning. The snow, I suspect, has thrown a wrench into many families' well-oiled daily routines.

It's disconcerting when something we cannot control disrupts the course of the day. I think it's especially true for us, because we usually have control over so much in our lives. We exercise control over mundane things like the temperature of the rooms in which we live; the foods we eat; and the kinds of activities in which we choose to participate. And, we have have lots of control over life-directing decisions like: our professions and the places we choose to call home.

While all of this may seem obvious, it's worth remembering that having so much control over our daily lives has not always been the case. For instance, in the days before Thomas Edison, monasteries structured their work and prayer lives around the sun's rising and setting. They did not have the ability, as we do, to lengthen their days by effective artificial light. And a large portion of our brothers and sisters around the globe have unreliable sources of electricity, which means that their schedules still revolve around the sun.

So, I suggest that, while it's a pain in the neck for snow to interfere with our plans, it's also a good thing. It's good to be reminded that, despite all our illusions to the contrary, we are not the ones who are in control. A good old-fashioned snowstorm causes us to look heavenward toward the One in whose hands we rest; the One in whose hands everything rests. As people of faith, we trust God, even when God may be moving more slowly than we'd like, or when the path ahead may seem unclear. And we trust as mystic Julian of Norwich did - that "all will be well. All manner of things will be well."

St. MAM Stories

He suffers from PTS, the victim of difficult years of service during the Vietnam War. This veteran walks in the tens, even hundreds of miles every week, in order to get to those he helps through yard work, trimming, clearing, and much more. He has no transportation and carries his tools with him. Shoes do not last long due to weather and the miles he puts on a pair of shoes. About once a year, he contacts our offices and asks if perhaps St. MAM might one more time be able to provide a pair of shoes. I have visited his home: a completely unfinished house on the inside, bathroom put in by him, a bed built out of lumber, and a sleeping bag atop the platform to support him when he sleeps. He epitomizes a man of pride, hard-working and as much as possible, selfsufficient. Through the years we have helped him in numerous ways but his gratitude for those shoes is particularly touching.

We can never fully comprehend the reality that the vulnerable live near us, who struggle to make ends meet, and who face the fear of having their power turned off, water turned off, being evicted, or losing their home. Some may even turn to payday loans where they are made all the more vulnerable through exploitive interest rates of as much as 400%. St. MAM is here, has been here for 41 years, and will continue to be here to help the vulnerable and the marginalized, provided that you continue to be the hands of ST. MAM. The shepherds were the most marginalized of their day. Isn't it interesting that God chose to announce the birth of his Son to the 'most marginalized'? -Dan G. Lane

Walking the Way with Jesus, Joy and Generosity

Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross... (Hebrews 12:1-2)



To be a disciple of Jesus is to go where Jesus goes and do what Jesus does, living in the forgiveness and new life offered every time we fail. Discipleship is walking the way of death and resurrection. Disciples of Jesus give themselves away for the sake of others, entrusting themselves to the grace of God that promises joy on the other side. The late seminary professor Walter Bouman reminded us that this mission, this discipleship, is made known in Holy Communion:

The Eucharist also gives us our mission. For what is present to us in this meal is nothing less than Christ's offering of himself for the world. In the meal he takes us up into his offering and makes us his body for the world. In the Eucharist we experience that there is more to do with our lives than to protect them. We are set free to offer them.

To be a disciple is to be gathered up into Jesus' offering of himself for the world, to become the crucified and risen Christ's body walking in the world through concrete practices and lived out commitments. Our 2014 Synod Assembly theme reminds us that we do this – as communities of faith and as individuals – with Jesus, joy and generosity.

We cross boundaries to join Jesus in places we'd never go on our own and with people we never dreamed we could love.

We witness to the joy of forgiveness and freedom, new life and resurrection offered to all in the wounded hands of the risen Christ.

We offer ourselves, our energy, our time, our financial and material resources with generosity beyond our own imagining or apparent capacity.

Of course, this cruciform discipleship does not come naturally or easily or instantly and we can't make it happen on our own. Pastor Jessicah Krey Duckworth puts it this way in her recent book, *Wide Welcome*:

Discipleship is not innate; we are not born disciples of Jesus Christ. Discipleship is experienced and learned; we become disciples of Jesus Christ...Discipleship is learning through participation in Christian practices, gaining knowledge and skill to sustain a Christian identity.

By nature, we'd rather keep all the good stuff to ourselves, whether material or spiritual, and we work hard at doing just that. Thankfully, God's Spirit converts us daily, often hourly, to the disciple way. Through water and Word and bread and wine and sisters and brothers in Christ and in the hungry, imprisoned, poor, ill, and wondering, wandering people around us God's Spirit continually calls us, gifts and gathers us, enlightens and empowers us, and makes us holy walk the way of the cross, to go where Jesus goes and do what Jesus does. May God's Spirit continually call and convert us from what holds us back and set us free to walk the Way with Jesus, joy and generosity!
